

The formation of CATSC in 1996 brought together the long traditions of three organisations - the Catholic Teachers Federation of England and Wales, the Association of Catholic Schools and Colleges and the Association of Religious in Education.

At the National Level, the Association works to support and safeguard the interests of Catholic Education and those working in it, as well as providing support for Catholic teachers working in other sectors. The Association enjoys good working relationships with the Bishops' Conference. The officers meet Bishop Sherrington, whose role is Episcopal Liaison to the Association. The officers also meet representatives of the Catholic Education Service.

Members of the National Executive Council represent the Association on working parties and ad hoc groups set up by the CES to deal with current issues in Catholic Education.

Through working relationships with various Catholic groups, the Association is pro-active in raising concerns of the membership on both an informal and formal basis when and where necessary.

CATSC is also active in responding on behalf of the membership to the vast number of initiatives and consultations presented by the DfE and the Welsh Government. The aim is to ensure that the distinctive voice of Catholic Schools and Colleges is heard in any national education debate.

The Association is also an active member of the World Union of Catholic Teachers (WUCT), where it speaks for its members, builds relationships with other Associations throughout the world, and encourages start-up groups in other countries.

Conferences and Study Weekends are arranged on both a regional and national level to explore, understand and discuss major issues affecting Catholic Education, our own faith development, and our roles in delivering education for our pupils and students. The uniqueness of the Association means that members from all the diverse regions meet and share ideas. The Annual Study Conference offers the opportunity to be part of the exchange of ideas and thoughts across different sectors.

Whilst the annual Senior Leaders' Conference for Secondary schools and Further Education Colleges affords many opportunities to promote and explore the rewards and challenges of leadership.

Networking, the website and Twitter all circulate news of the Association. These media offer a chance to share national and international ideas and to be a part of thinking through and exploring the theological nature of the Catholic perspective. Occasional papers are produced on topics of important interest. The Research Committee works with prominent academics to co-ordinate and encourage the publication of studies which both celebrate and endorse the success of our distinctive Catholic Education sector.

To create a network of support for all colleagues in Catholic education and for all other Catholic teachers

- by organising an annual residential conference which is a major event in the Association calendar
- by organising an annual Senior Leaders conference for senior staff in High Schools and Further Education Colleges
- by organising other conferences and courses of a national, regional, Diocesan or local nature, either residential or non-residential
- by issuing to all members a termly newsletter containing news reports, articles and information of future events
- by offering guidance and advice on personal, spiritual, career or professional matters

To promote Catholic education by celebrating successes within our schools and colleges

- by identifying and promoting good practice
- by exhibiting some of the excellent work achieved by pupils, students and teachers

To be prepared to act as a voice for Catholic teachers, schools and colleges

- by using existing networks through which we can consult with Catholic teachers and others who work in Catholic schools and colleges, on matters of concern or interest
- by representing such views to the relevant authorities
- by being represented on Catholic Education Service Advisory Committees
- by representing an authentic voice of Catholic teachers, schools and colleges through the media

To maintain and develop links with international organisations serving Catholic education

- by being a member of the World Union of Catholic Teachers
- by encouraging European awareness through links with known organisations by identifying opportunities for study tours and exchanges

To promote the recognition and development of our distinctive role in the life of the Church

- by providing opportunities for professional development which meet the needs of Catholic schools and colleges
- by providing opportunities to celebrate what is already being achieved in Catholic schools and colleges
- by providing a programme of distinctive in-service training
- by providing a network for consultation

- by campaigning on behalf of Catholic education whenever necessary
- by working with local and Diocesan bodies

- by representing the interests of those who work in Catholic schools and colleges
- by maintaining and extending links with other organisations

The National Executive Council is required by the Constitution and Standing Orders to ensure that representation of certain 'interest groups' is ensured. Therefore, in addition to the Officers, each Diocese in England and Wales is intended to be represented.

The Association encourages representation both on, and by, Council of other organisations whose membership is concerned with the Catholic Church, and/or Education.

National Council invites any organisations with an interest in Catholic Education to nominate a representative, who has observer status, and whose expenses are paid by the nomination body.

World Union of Catholic Teachers

The World Union of Catholic Teachers (WUCT) is a Non-Governmental Organisation which is recognised by the Holy See as the only international group to represent Catholic Teachers across the world. It therefore has the right to represent Catholic teachers at the United Nations and any of its agencies. WUCT is committed to achieving Free Universal Primary Education for all and other Human Rights for which it co-operates with other interested Groups particularly UNESCO through its Education for All (EFA) initiative.

WUCT seeks to work with other nongovernmental organisations to achieve common goals based on Catholic Social Teaching. WUCT invites local, national and international groups and organisations of Catholic Teachers and Educators, committed to these objectives, to become members in order to work for the advancement of Human Dignity AND Rights, the Church's Social Teaching, and the fulfilment of the role of Catholic Professional Educators. Several significant developments have taken place in the past two years. There has been an increased level of cooperation with and participation in UNESCO events. WUCT was represented at the UNESCO NGOs Conference in December 2018 by the President and the Treasurer. The theme of the 2018 International Conference of NGOs held at UNESCO Headquarters bi-annually was 'Enhancing and promoting the commitment and contribution of UNESCO's NGO partners'. Over 250 NGOs contributed to debate with over 20 renowned panellists from the academic and business worlds, on the challenges of the digital revolution.

In December 2019 Prof. John Lydon, CATSC Treasurer, participated acted as moderator for the Forum International Lay Catholic-inspired Organisations, held in Rome. The theme of the Forum 2019 was *Towards a More Inclusive Society*. The objective of the Forum was to consider how the international Thematic Experts network can contribute to strengthening the Catholic voice and faith in the political-economic debates with the aim of leaving no one behind and an emphasising a commitment to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals for achievement by 2030. The responsibility the Catholic Church and its NGOs to strengthen its voice in terms of creating a more inclusive society and maintaining its distinctive identity has become increasingly significant. In the words of the Forum secretariat WUCT, is regarded as a "very much invited and desired" presence on this global stage. The Vatican Secretariat was represented by Cardinal Parolin. The Forum closed with a private audience for all forum delegates with his Holiness Pope Francis in the Apostolic Palace.
